Read books, attend allyship workshops, and follow social media activists to keep up with relevant news and activist opportunities.

Be an Advocate for Transgender Rights

You can be an advocate for transgender rights by supporting transgender organizations and initiatives. You can also speak out against discrimination and prejudice, especially if you see it happening around you. If there are no local resources available to support trans people, consider some of the following ideas:

- Volunteer at a local LGBTQ youth center or drop-in center (if one exists).
- Participate in rallies and events that support transgender rights and promote inclusivity within your community (i.e. Pride events, school board meetings, etc.)
- Show your support for transgender youth by being a visible ally. This can include wearing a pin or other symbol of support, speaking up in support of transgender youth, and being a positive role model for others in your community.
